STUDENTS SET TO BENEFIT FROM TRUST-WIDE HARDSHIP FUND



A Hardship Fund which will support students facing financial difficulties has been launched across 25 academies by the St Ralph Sherwin Catholic Multi Academy Trust. The fund is a source of financial help available to all registered full-time students at 20 Trust primary and 5 secondary schools in Derbyshire and the surrounding counties. It will help students who are

experiencing difficulties through hardship in paying for: curriculum trips, visits, and residential courses; uniform, shoes, or sports kit; other materials or equipment required for academic studies; attendance at seminars, interviews, or work experience placements and emergency travel expenses.

There is also the opportunity for qualifying students to be able to access one free school meal each day during recognised academy holidays through the fund.

Sean McClafferty, Trust Chief Executive, said he was pleased that the Trust was able to support those students most in need. He said: "The Trust acknowledges the difficulties faced by many of the families we serve, particularly with the effects of Coronavirus on the community.

"All of our students should have the same access to important aspects of

their education and their financial situation should not be a barrier to that."

The Bronze award means that St Charles' Senior Leadership Team understands what is involved in the award and is committed to embarking on the UNICEF UK rights respecting journey. It also recognises that the right foundations are in place for the school's journey to the second stage, which is Silver.

The award recognises achievement in putting the UN Convention on the Right of the Child (UNCRC) at the heart of a school's practice to improve wellbeing and help all children and young people realise their potential. UNCRC recognises that all children have the right to be treated with dignity, fairness, to be

St Anne's CVA praised for charity donations



A charity appeal which was supported by pupils and parents at St Anne's Catholic Voluntary Academy in Buxton raised over £1,400.

Mrs Wiggins, headteacher at St Anne's, thanked parents after she said they were 'overwhelmed' with donations for

the Helping Hands pop up shop, which ran at The Source Café in Terrace Road.

Helping Hands is run by volunteers including Hannah Tarplee, a Friends of St Anne's chair and governor. Mrs Wiggins said she was delighted at how the school community had joined together to support those in need. She said: "After a difficult year we wanted to do whatever we could do to help families in our town who have experienced financial hardship because of the COVID restrictions. Initially, we were going to ask our parents for donations of food for the local food bank but decided to also request donations of new/good condition toys and warm clothing such as coats, too.

"The collections were advertised on social media and on our school Dojo page - our Friends of St Anne's chair (who is also one of our governors) rallied her volunteers and a number of before school and after school collections were planned. Children brought food into school, parents arrived with bags stuffed full of toys and clothes. We were overwhelmed by the generosity of families who donated and by the way our school community came together to support those in need, in our wider community."

Hannah thanked St Anne's and all those who donated to the appeal.

She said: "All items were on sale for a minimal amount, most £1 or less, to provide families with the ability to choose the gifts and the dignity to say that they had provided for their families. From the beginning, we said all proceeds from the sale of items would be donated directly to The Food Bank in Buxton.

"We're now pleased to say a massive £1,425.41 was raised by Helping Hands and this will donated to The High Peak Food Bank and the excellent projects they run."

Alisha races to 2020 Vice Champion title



St Philip Howard student Alisha Palmowski is celebrating after winning a top racing title. Alisha finished the shortened Championship Season in second place (out of 28) and was therefore the 2020 Junior DRS100 (Daniel Ricciardo Series UK) Vice Champion.

Her dad Martin said: "We as parents are extremely proud, particularly as this is a national championship that attracts some of the country's leading young

"Her on-track ability continues to gain attention and positive reactions and she is booked to enter the Ginetta Junior Scholarship, where the successful driver (out of approx. 60 entrants) wins a fully funded season racing these cars as a support series alongside the BTCC (British Touring Car Championship) which is aired on live TV.

"Whilst this is a long shot, based on the calibre and much more experienced competition, Alisha showed amazing promise in one of these cars earlier in the year when she had a formal test day with the official Ginetta works factory team."



St Edward's CVA, hub school for the Swadlincote Partnership, launched a marvellous marble

challenge for pupils and their families – with more than 200 families across the Partnership taking place.

Families were challenged to develop a track for a marble to travel along, with a journey time from start to finish of 35 seconds. The Ogden partnership funding was used to buy the marble run kits which were provided to each family who took part and included card, art straws, a marble, sellotape and blue tack. Once they had built and tested their track, the children had to submit a video to their school for judging. Teachers at each school selected three winners: best design, most ingenious and closest to the given time limit. Each of these winners received a £10 Amazon voucher.
